Summer Lawn Care Tips: Submitted by Jeff Williams: Carefree North Resident and owner/operator Green With Envy Lawn CareP

Summer days mean lots of sun, fun and hopefully a yard that will hold up to the hot weather as well as outdoor gatherings. Most of us like to maintain a nice looking lawn year round, and especially during the summer months when you spend more time there. The summer months are much more challenging to keep the lawn looking great than the spring and fall seasons. The following suggestions are some of my tips for keeping your lawn healthy and looking great throughout the summer months. Most of today's tips will focus on proper mowing practices.

- 1) Longer Is Better Many people cut their grass too short. Optimal length for most of the cool season grasses in our area is around 3 inches. I really feel that 3 inches is a minimum. We cut most the properties that we service in the 3.25"-4" range. I generally maintain my personal lawn at around 3.75" throughout the season. When you cut the grass higher it provides many benefits to the turf. The turf is under less stress. Taller thicker grass creates a more competitive environment for weeds to try to crowd into. Taller thicker grass provides shade that is both beneficial to the grass shoots but it also provides shade that many weeds hate. There are numerous other benefits to raising that mower deck a few notches. One of the most damaging mowing practices is to let the grass get to tall and then try to cut it to short. You should never remove more than 1/3 of the grass blade during any one mowing session. To remove more puts the grass under tremendous stress in this already stressful time of the year.
- 2) Be sure to maintain sharp blades; Mowing with dull blades creates a variety of potential; problems. The average Carefree homeowner should ideally sharpen their mower blades 3 times during the mowing season. At least be sure to start the season with sharp blades and to sharpen them again in late summer.
- 3) To mulch or not to mulch? Summer is a great time to mulch and recycle your clippings. It can be tough to mulch the clippings during the heavy growth months of spring but summer is ideal for mulching. It makes for less work than bagging, there is not as much clean-up as there will be with side discharge and the clippings returning to the soil are heavy in nutrients and Nitrogen. Mulching is a great practice and good for your turf.
- 4) Proper Watering: For those of us with irrigation systems or who drag the garden hose around. When watering established turf grass infrequent and heavy watering is the best irrigation practice. A lawn needs about 1 in. of water a week. If you're allowed to use a sprinkler or irrigation system, water twice a week applying 1/2 in. of water per session. Frequent light watering does more harm than good because it encourages shallow root growth. So use a rain gauge or a soup can placed nearby to measure the amount of water you are applying. Of course, to avoid wasting water, be mindful of proper sprinkler setup. Be sure that water is not being wasted on sidewalks, driveways or the patio.
- 5) Grub Control: Grub worms are subsurface feeding insects that are the larvae of different summer beetles. Grubs are pretty much in every lawn, but when their numbers get out of hand, they will damage your turf in major ways. It is best to apply grub worm control in June or July and definitely make sure you water it in after applying. If you don't water it in, the product will degrade in direct sunlight and be less effective. I always recommend grub products that utilize Merit as the main insecticide.
