Lawn Care Tips by Jeff Williams, Owner of Green With Envy Lawn Care and 9 year Carefree North resident

Last year's drought took a heavy toll on many lawns in the central Indiana area. We have been extremely busy this spring with lawn repairs and renovations. Here are some tips to successfully over seed your lawn and to spot repair bad spots within your turf area.

1) Timing: Late summer or early fall is the absolute best time of the year to over seed with cool season grasses. I know this isn't an option for many of us desiring a decent lawn this summer so a spring seeding may be the ticket. Spring seedings can be very successful and one of the advantages seeding in the spring does have is over late summer or early fall is we probably get some help from nature with adequate rain fall. If you have a lawn service company, make sure they have not applied a preemergent herbicide before you begin the seeding process. If you have a lawn service you will want to notify the company that you plan to seed your lawn and they should check with you before making any applications.

Cleaning windows for spring is a wonderful way to welcome this new season.

No streaking formula:

1 quart water

1 tsp. dishwashing soap

2 tsp. vinegar

Splash of rubbing alcohol

Mix together in a spray bottle and use newspaper to wipe off the windows.

Another great idea is to wear a tool belt with pouches and pack on your cleaning supplies especially good if cleaning high places and using a ladder.

Cleaning mirrors formula:

1 cup club soda ½ cup water

Mix together in a spray bottle

- 2) Choose quality grass seed: Seed is not all the same and you want to be certain you are choosing a high quality grass seed with a high germination rate. The percent of certified seed content should be available on the bag of seed. Bluegrass and perennial rye combinations are often a good choice for our area and there are many quality turf type tall fescues on the market that would be an excellent choice. You may want to do some research to determine the best grass type for your lawn. For more information about seed selection you may contact our friends at Glenn's Valley Feed & Seed at 888-7887.
- **3) Mow Your Lawn Short:** One of the big reasons to avoid scalping your lawn most of the time is that it opens your lawn up to weeds. But the same conditions that give weeds an easy entrance also make it easy for your newly over seeded lawn to take hold. You want your new lawn seeds to have as much contact with the soil as possible, so scalp away.
- **4) Prep your Soil:** You need to give the new seeds the most hospitable home possible. Remove thatch, and consider aerating your lawn. Loosen the soil with a strong raking as well. This is also a great time to test your soil and amend your soil, whether it's upping its phosphorous levels or adjusting its ph. **Continued on page 4**

- **5) Spread Seed/Starter Fertilizer:** Determine how much seed your project requires. You will need to know the approximate square footage of the turf area you plan to seed or over seed. The seed you select should have the suggested application rate listed on the bag. You should use a drop spreader or a rotary "broadcast" spreader to achieve even coverage. You may need to calibrate your spreader. To do this set the spreader drop rate according to your normal walking pace. How fast you walk will influence the coverage and your spreader settings. Your spreader will have instructions for doing this. Fill your spreader with half of the seed and spread the seed evenly walking in one direction. Next, fill the spreader with the other half of the seed and over seed walking perpendicular to the previous direction. Whether you overlap each row slightly depends on whether you are using a drop spreader or a broadcast spreader. With drop spreaders, you do not overlap-but you do precisely line up with your row. Broadcast spreaders require overlapping the throw pattern by about 1/3 on the next pass.
- **6) Top dress/Erosion Control**: While generally not necessary, especially when just over seeding to fairly established turf, you may want to consider adding a top dressing to the newly seeded area or installing an erosion control blanket or just using straw. You may want to research these options especially when seeding to a historically "problem area".
- 7) Water: If possible, you want to water newly seeded areas lightly and frequently until you notice the new grass begin to establish itself. On established turf the opposite is true and it is best to water deeply and infrequently. Try to keep foot traffic and animal activity to a minimum on newly seeded areas.
